Bellin Health makes \$25,000 annual commitment to Altrusa House

Bellin Health has announced it will contribute \$25,000 annually toward Altrusa House, enhancing its commitment to this critical home-away-from-home for patients and families of Green Bay's hospitals.

The 12-bed facility at 1116 E. Mason St. sits on Bellin-owned land just blocks from Bellin Hospital. The health system has long donated parking and hospital goods, as well as security and transportation services, to assist in the running of the house. Still, there was a desire to do more.

"Altrusa House provides such an invaluable service to patients and families, often during some of the most difficult times they face," said George Kerwin, Bellin Health President and CEO. "The facility does an amazing job operating on a lean budget, but we felt we really needed to step up and do more to help."

The \$25,000 will be distributed each October, beginning in 2017. The funds will be used toward operational costs for the facility, which during the 2016-17 fiscal year provided 3,554 nights of lodging to guests from 15 states. The average length of stay was six days, but some people have stayed at the facility for weeks or even months.

"The numbers speak for themselves. The work Altrusa House does to assist patients and families is nothing short of phenomenal," said Tracy VandeLoo, Bellin Health team leader for case management. "We know many of these individuals have financial need, and would be out of options if they had to pay for a hotel. Plus, lodging can be hard to come by — particularly during Packers season — and these individuals and families have to have a safe, comfortable place to stay."

Bellin looks forward to continuing its relationship with Altrusa House, which has become a critical part of the services the health system offers to patients and families.

"By removing the stress of lodging for families, Altrusa House allows them to contribute to the healing process by focusing on being there for their loved ones," Kerwin said. "We hope this contribution helps the facility thrive for years to come."

Altrusa House future is bright, uses donations wisely

This past year we made a huge difference to 591 guests who spent 3,554 nights at the Altrusa House. By providing safe and secure low-cost temporary lodging, we eliminated a major financial and emotional burden for them.

The operating cost budget for the past fiscal year ended May 31, 2017, was \$124,365. Our house is now 16 years old so we have experienced a number of repair and maintenance issues. We now have a brand new air-conditioning system and computer system. I am thrilled to report the actual operating costs were only \$119,767. To end the fiscal year with a positive balance emphasizes how fiscally responsible we have been.

The Annual Altrusa House Golf Outing in June and the Annual Newsletter-Phantom Ball in October are our major fundraisers, raising 23% and 22%, respectively, of our actual operating expenses. The Altrusa House has 24/7 coverage, accomplishing this with only three paid employees and volunteers who donate thousands of hours each year. We are also grateful for the following grants: Evenor Fund, \$7,000; Green Bay Packer Foundation, \$5,000; Newman's Own Foundation, \$5,000; and Nicolet National Bank, \$500.

We are always looking for ways to ensure continued success for the Altrusa House. With that in mind, we are researching establishment of an Altrusa House Advisory Board. We all feel that the future is bright for the Altrusa House.
